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LA TÓRTOLA *STREPTOPELIA DECAOCTO* (AVES: COLUMBIDAE) EN CUBA

A partir de la década del 30 la Tórtola Eurasíatica, *Streptopelia decaocto* Frivaldszky, 1852, comenzó una explosión demográfica que la llevó a dispersarse en poco tiempo por toda Europa y el norte de África.

La especie fue traída por el hombre al continente Americano. En 1974 escaparon algunos individuos de un aviario de Nassau, Bahamas, y otros fueron liberados intencionalmente. Ya en 1975 se observaron las primeras parejas criando en estado silvestre y, a partir de esa fecha la dispersión de esta tórtola en otras islas de las Bahamas no se hizo esperar.

La fecha de su entrada a los cayos del sur de la Florida, así como en la propia península, no puede establecerse con seguridad debido a que esta paloma fué, y es confundida con la Tórtola Doméstica, *Streptopelia risoria*. *Streptopelia decaocto* se informó criando por primera vez en 1980 en los cayos de Isla Morada y a partir de esa fecha se ha expandido su distribución a muchas áreas de la península de la Florida (Smith 1987).

A la caída de la tarde del 11 de marzo de 1990, Alexander y Orlando Garrido, mientras atendían el palomar de la casa de uno de nosotros (Garrido) en un barrio de la ciudad de La Habana, a 1,300 m del litoral encontraron una tórtola que había bajado a comer al patio. El autor principal comprobó el hallazgo, que resultó ser la Tórtola Euroasiática. La paloma permaneció en el lugar hasta el anochecer y durmió en un árbol cercano.

Durante los tres días siguientes la tórtola visitó el mismo patio, al menos en horas de la tarde.

Esta tórtola, que es muy parecida a *Streptopelia risoria*, la que no vive en Cuba en estado silvestre, es algo mayor, de coloración más oscura y poseedora de un vuelo rápido, semejante al de la Paloma Aliblanca *Zenaida asiatica*.

Es interesante traer a colación el informe que un año antes hiciera a Kirkconnell un trabajador de Cayo Coco (al norte de la provincia de Ciego de Ávila) sobre tres tórtolas grises observadas allí en los alrededores de un palomar. Aunque hasta el presente este informe permanece como hipotético, constituye el primer record de esta tórtola en nuestro territorio.

Announcements

The Library of Natural Sounds will conduct a workshop on recording bird sounds, 8-15 June 1991, at San Francisco State University's Sierra Nevada Field Research Station. The course will consist of field recording and lecture sessions, and will use microcomputer based software to analyze recordings and performance of equipment. Topics to be covered are selection and application of recorders and microphones, recording theory, and techniques, metering, and documentation for sound recordings. Participants may obtain 2 college credit hours, at \$60/hr, through San Francisco State's Biology Department. The course fee is \$550, including rustic, but comfortable lodging. Participation limited to 16, enrollment first-come first-served. A non-refundable deposit of \$100 reserves a space; balance due by 17 May. VISA or MasterCard accepted.
